fter numerous interventions and meetings between the Municipality and the Transport Ministry, major improvement works were completed on 5th Avenue (Route 371). This project was estimated at two million dollars and will be much appreciated by residents in that sector. Also completed were works on Murphy road as part of council's road improvement plan.

As I am sure everyone has noticed, construction of the residence for seniors and persons with slightly diminished autonomy has begun. This project will be completed by June 2013 and will open for residents by July 1st. This project will certainly be appreciated by the community and is eagerly anticipated.

In collaboration with the MRC, bus services will be available on our territory. This service will have two departing trips in the morning and two return trips in the afternoon. The three stops will be the community center, the RTC terminals in Loretteville (Caron and Racine) and the zoo. This will be available in January and will enable users to connect with city buses at the aforementioned terminals. The bus will be a new, 40 passenger with air-conditioning, captain seats, free Wi-Fi and will also have a rack for bicycles. Your municipal council has committed to this project for a three year period because we believe in offering as many services to the population as possible and hope it will be useful for our citizens.

Our annual volunteer appreciation night will be held

on December 6. I cannot stress how important our volunteers are in making our community what it is today. I hope all volunteers enjoy this evening as a thank-you for all their dedication and hard work.

In closing we were saddened to hear of the recent passing of our former mayor Lewis Jack. He was mayor of our Municipality for 19 years from 1969 to 1988 and contributed greatly to the growth and well-being of the community. We extend our most sincere condolences to the family.


DRYER FIRES

Here's how to avoid dryer fires:

- Lack of maintenance is the number one cause of dryer fires. That is why it is critical to clean the lint filter before and after each use, and wipe away any lint that has accumulated around the drum.
- Perform periodic checks to ensure that the air exhaust vent pipe is unobstructed (lint accumulation) and the outdoor vent flap opens readily.
- Do not run the dryer without a lint filter.
- You are strongly encouraged NOT to leave the dryer running if you go out, in case it malfunctions.

WINTER DRIVING

- 1. **Roads are slippery in winter!** Keep your distance, reduce your speed and signal your intentions early, because when it is cold out, tire grip decreases.
- 2. **Distance between vehicles.** Regardless of your speed, it is recommended to always keep a safe distance, representing a time lapse of about two seconds, between you and the vehicle if front of you and to increase this distance in bad weather.
- 3. **Snow.** Before getting on the road, make sure to sweep your vehicle's windows, headlights and windshield wipers clear of snow. For example, the snow accumulated on your hood could suddenly detach itself and impair your visibility or that of another driver which could cause a collision.
- 4. Winter tires, the law is clear. From December 15th to March 15th, taxis and passenger vehicles registered in Quebec must be equipped with snow tires designed for winter driving since these increase the grip of the vehicle on snowy or icy roads.

JANUARY - DOG LICENSE RENEWAL MONTH

id you know that according to by-law no. 121 Article 6.1, the guardian of a dog, within the limits of the Municipality, must, in the month of January of each year, obtain a new license for said dog, except in the case of a guide dog. The license issued by virtue of this by-law is annual, for the period from January 1st to December 31st. The cost of the license applies to each dog and is determined in the following manner:

\$10 for 1st dog

\$20 for 2nd dog

\$30 for 3rd dog

\$150 for a kennel or 3 or more dogs

Each year, the S.P.A. of Quebec receives thousands of stray animals and the majority of these animals do not wear any identification. In order to give your beloved animal every chance of coming home, it is essential that he wear his license. If you lose your animal, immediately contact the Municipality and the Quebec S.P.A. at 418 527-9104 during business hours.

Don't forget to come by the municipal office to purchase a license for your dog as of January 3^{rd} .



MUNICIPAL BY-LAWS FOR THE WINTER SEASON

In order to avoid any inconvenience during the winter season, the Municipality would like to remind you of a few regulations that may help the snow removal process.

BY-LAW NO. 120

Article 8.1:

Parking of Vehicles on Public Roads

We would like to remind you that:

"Except in cases of major breakdowns, no one may park, abandon, or immobilize a motor vehicle in such a way that it may hide signage, impede traffic, road maintenance or snow removal or block access to a street or property." (Under penalty of law).

Article 11.1:

Nuisance

In addition to a penalty of law (fine) the police may order the removal of any vehicle parked in such a way that it may impede traffic, road works, including road maintenances or snow removal; and may therefore order the towing of this vehicle.

Article 12:

Fine

All infractions to the present by-law renders the offender liable to pay a minimum fine of \$30.00 plus costs.

OUTDOOR WINTER STORAGE

11.3 OUTDOOR **STORAGE** OF **FIREWOOD**

The outdoor storage of firewood for noncommercial reasons (personal usage for a main building) is authorized on a property where there is a main building. The storage must respect all of the following conditions:

- The wood must be properly piled and corded; it may at no time be left in a bulk pile on the property except for a maximum continuous period of 30 days;
- The storage of firewood must be done in the side or back yards of the property at a minimal distance of 2 meters (6'6") from the property line, except if an impervious fence or hedge conforming to the present bylaw is installed between property line and the cord of wood. The maximum fence height is 2 meters (6'6'');

- located underneath the aforementioned;
- The maximum height of a firewood storage pile is 2 meters (6'6").

A firewood shed may be installed on a property where a residential building is situated conforming to the present bylaw.

The outdoor storage of firewood is authorized on a vacant lot located in a zone other than residential. The wood must be properly piled, corded and stored at a maximum height of 2 meters (6'6") and must respect the siting standards prescribed by the concerned zone.

OUTDOOR STORAGE OF 11.4 RECREATIONAL VEHICLES

The outdoor storage of recreational vehicles such as trailers (motorized or tent-trailers, snowmobiles, not), motorcycles, watercraft, recreational-craft

The storage of firewood must not is authorized on a property where a obstruct a window, door or exit nor residential building is situated, under the following conditions:

- a. Must be located in the side or back yards at a minimal distance of 2 meters (6'6") of the side and back property lines; if it cannot otherwise be located, it can be partially stored in the front yard at a minimal distance of 2 meters (6'6") from the property line without side overlapping more than 2 meters (6'6") on the front yard measured from the front wall of the residential building;
- b. Vehicles must be in working order and must be registered for travel on roadways, trails or water for the year.

A snowmobile, watercraft, motorcycle or all other recreational vehicles must be stored indoors or may not be visible from the road during their respective off -seasons in Quebec.

CONDITIONS CONCERNING SNOW AND ICE

ARTICLE 8.1 Snow and ice on public land

- 8.1.1 It is prohibited for any person to throw or to dispose of snow or ice on any public land, park, walkway or any other public place.
- 8.1.2 It is prohibited for any person to throw or to dispose of snow or ice onto sidewalks or trails in a way that restricts the area available for pedestrians following snow-removal by the Municipality or by the contractor who carries out this task.
- 8.1.3 It is prohibited for any person to throw or dispose of snow or ice into a public right of way in such a way that the snow or ice may obstruct the view of a road sign, the minimum clearance from a fire hydrant (1.20 m.) or the visibility triangle as defined in the zoning by-law.
- 8.1.4 It is prohibited for any person to throw or dispose of snow or ice in any roadway suited for vehicles or on the sides of these roads.

8.1.5 It is prohibited for any person to throw or to dispose of snow or ice into watercourse or ditches.

ARTICLE 8.2 Public works / road maintenance

The people responsible for the snow removal within the limits of the Municipality may blow, dump or dispose of snow onto sidewalks / walkways or onto private land, as long as all necessary precautions have been taken in order to avoid all personal or property damages.

ARTICLE 8.3 Abrasives

- 8.3.1 It is strictly prohibited for any person to remove or cover, in any way, any sand or other abrasive substance spread out on the sidewalks, walkways, streets or public lands.
- 8.3.2 It is prohibited for any person to dispose of or to allow the disposal of any substance that could leak onto any road, sidewalk, walkway or public place, or that could freeze and form ice or produce uneven surfaces on sidewalks or walkways, streets or public lands.

POSITIONING OF ROLLING BINS

he positioning of rolling bins on the day of garbage/recycling collection often poses a problem for snow removal contractors * affecting their ability to properly carry out their task.

Here are a few recommendations that should help facilitate garbage and recycling collection:

* We remind you that bins should be placed in your * You can place your bins at

driveway, not on the shoulder of the road and should be at a distance of 1 meter from the public road.

- Leave a distance of 2 feet (0.6 meters) between bins and any other objects (mailboxes, trees, winter shelters, fences, markers for snow removal) to facilitate the use of the truck's mechanical arm.

- * Never place any materials on bin covers.
- * Bin wheels and handles should be facing residence.
- * You must put away your bins once the collection has been accomplished.

NON-HOUSEHOLD WASTE COLLECTION (BULK WASTE)

uring the winter season, collection of non-household waste is held once monthly on the first Thursday of the month (December 6th, January 3rd, February 7th and March 7th). Therefore, the last weekly pick up will be held on Thursday, November 29th. We would like to remind you that you must call the Municipality at 418 844-1218 to register for this service. You may also register on the Municipality's website under the «Online Request» section.

snow removal services. It is the responsibility of all proprietors to insure that their mailbox is installed securely and that it does not interfere with the winter maintenance of roads.



DEPOSIT OF NEW ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR 2013-2014-2015

The assessment roll and you!

The three-year assessment roll for the Municipality of Saint-Gabriel-de-Valcartier for the years 2013, 2014, 2015 was deposited on the 26th of October 2012 by the evaluation firm Groupe Altus. Public Notice of this deposit was published on October 29th, 2012. Those interested may consult the roll at the Municipal office from Monday to Friday from 8:30 am to noon and from 1:00 to 4:00 pm.

According to the Ministère des Affaires municipales de Régions et de l'Occupation du territoire (MAMROT), here are the most frequently asked questions regarding municipal property assessment as well as their answers.

What is an ASSESSMENT ROLL?

The assessment roll is a resume of the inventory of properties situated on the territory of a local municipality. Its main use consists of indicating, for municipal and school taxation purposes, the value of every property based on its real value.

What is the REAL VALUE?

The real value or market value of a property is its exchange value on the free and open competitive market. In other words, it is the most probable price that a buyer will accept to pay if the property were for sale.

WHEN does an assessment role come into effect?

The assessment roll comes into effect on

the 1st of January of the first exercise for which it is prepared.

What is the DURATION of the roll?

The evaluator prepares the assessment roll every three years and for three consecutive financial exercises.

This means that unless modifications are made to the property, its real value registered in the roll remains the same for the duration of the roll, being three years.

Can the assessment roll be MODIFIED during these 3 years?

At its updating, the assessment roll may be modified for various reasons, notably in the cases of renovation or expansion of a property.

NEW PUBLIC TRANSIT SERVICE AS OF JANUARY 21st

Routes and proposed services

Departure:

- Metropolitan bus passes will allow you to use both the TCJC services as well as the RTC and other metropolitan transit services (STLévis, Québec-Lévis Ferry, PLUMobile) are also available at certain locations in Québec.

Buy Smart! Buy Used!

Do you need to buy new appliances but your budget won't allow for it? As winter nears, your daughter is asking for new skis as your son, recently was accepted to university, needs furniture for his new apartment. How can it all be done?

Developed by the Communauté métropolitaine de Québec (CMQ), the B o t t i n d u r é e m p l o i (www.reduiremesdechets.com) (French website only) was made with you in mind. It lists close to 350 businesses where you can purchase many used everyday items at reasonable prices: clothing, sports equipment, furniture, appliances, tools, toys, computers, books...

The Bottin du réemploi allows vou to



search by the type of item needed and the area in which you would like to buy it, no matter where you live on the territory of the CMQ north shore (27 municipalities between Sainte-Catherine-de-la-Jacques-Cartier and Saint-Tite-des-Caps, including the 6 districts of Quebec). The lists will provide you with the name, address, telephone number and website of companies. You may also print out a PDF file of your search to keep at home.

What's more is that the *Bottin du* réemploi tells you where you can donate, in your area, a multitude of items you

no longer need but are still in good condition. You can also find where to take your leftover paint, your batteries and other hazardous household waste.

Reusing means giving a second life to useful items. By donating items that are still in good condition, you help people or organizations and contribute to the reduction of the disposal of goods that could still be useful. By buying used items that are still in good repair, you save money. Who could ask for more?

THE CBJC IMPROVING THE HABITAT OF THE TROUT

Sainte-Catherine-de-la-Jacques-Cartier, September 26th, 2012 - The Corporation du Bassin de la Jacques Cartier (CBJC) has again improved the facilities on the waterways of the territory in order to improve the habitat of the trout (brook trout).





tributary of the Rivière aux Pommes, was cleaned up on a distance of almost 1 km. Four complexes with spawning thresholds, two energy dissipating thresholds and deflectors were built. A stabilization of the banks including the planting of more than 1000 trees was completed. This project was made possible thanks to the Fondation de la faune du Québec, Syngenta and the RBC Blue Water project, Fondation Héritage Faune, Programme Prime-Vert of the Ministère de l'Agriculture, des Pêcheries et de l'Alimentation du Québec (MAPAQ) and funds from the Truites de Donnacona, Pont-Rouge and Catshalac hunting and fishing associations.

Next, the CBIC was mandated by Héritage Faune to build facilities on the Rivière Charland in Saint-Augustin-de-Desmaures. It consisted in the creation of 3 complexes of thresholds with spawning, nursery and rest areas. These facilities are an integral part of the interpretation trail conceived by the Fédération des chasseurs et pêcheurs and are located in

> proximity to their head office. We would like to thank the students of the Duchesnay Forestry and Wood Technology School who participated in the lifting of many, many rocks!

In person: Checks, cash or direct payment (debit card) are accepted.

Payment by check: Payments by check must be made in one payment dated January 15th, 2013 and in the name of "*Municipalité de Saint-Gabriel-de-Valcartier*". For amounts exceeding \$125, it is possible to make two instalments; the first for January 15th, 2013 and the second for February 15th, 2013. A fee of \$10 will be applicable for a check returned for insufficient funds and the payment will have to be made in cash.



Put an End to Bullying Advice for adults to help kids

What is taxing?

Taxing is a robbery with violence committed against a person. Within the context of the Law, it is a robbery. The abuser may use threats, intimidation or physical force to obtain property against the will of its owner.

What is bullying?

Bullying is a special relationship characterized by an abuse of power and repeated

deliberations of a person or group of people over another (insults, ridicule, exclusion, threats). Bullying infringes on civil rights but in more severe cases, it can be regarded as a criminal act.

TAXING & BULLYING



What is cyber-bullying?

Cyber-bullying consists of a series of repeated psychological attacks committed by an individual or group of individuals who reach their victims by the Internet, by email or by text messages via a cell phone. The victims of cyber-bullying may feel even more powerless compared to those of traditional bullying because the aggressor remains anonymous and the propagation of words and images is instantaneous and unlimited.

Taxing or bullying are not problems that children can resolve by themselves. It is a balance of power that can be difficult to change without the help of an adult. If your child is a victim of taxing or bullying and he/she confides in you, you must take the situation very seriously. Don't forget that children come to adults with their problems as a last resort.

If your child is a victim of taxing or bullying, here are a few steps that you can follow :

- * Notify the teacher, principal or school board if the bullying is committed at school or during school bus transportation. Even if the bullying occurs outside of school, it is a good idea to advise the school administration if the aggressor goes to the same school as your child.
- Depending on the age of the aggressor, try to discuss the problem with his/her parents. You may also call on the services of an alternative justice mediator at www.rojaq.qc.ca
- You may advise the police of a taxing or bullying situation and lodge a criminal complaint against the aggressor.
- * Depending on the severity of the act, you may advice the Youth Protection Service (DPJ) of the aggressor's behaviour.

At all times, you may consult a lawyer in order to know your rights.
