

OWNERS OF URBAN CHICKENS AND SMALL BIRD FARMS—AVIAN FLU



Since April 2022, 31 poultry farms (including 7 non-commercial farms) have tested positive for highly pathogenic avian influenza

H5N1 in Quebec. Infection has significant consequences for the affected farm, but also for nearby farms and for the entire poultry industry.

Spring Migration and Transmission

With the arrival of spring, wild birds will resume their journey along the migratory routes. By their increased presence on the territory, they contribute to the spread of the virus and thus increase the risk of contamination of domestic birds.

Avian influenza is transmitted directly from one bird to another through secretions and feces. The virus can also be introduced indirectly when humans or contaminated equipment come into contact with birds or their environment. For example, the virus can be found in food or water or on contaminated vehicle wheels, boots or hands.

Preventive measures

<u>Prevention and biosecurity measures</u> must be strictly enforced and vigilance must remain high.

The Ministère de l'Agriculture, des Pêcheries et de

l'Alimentation du Québec (MAPAQ) currently advises against all gatherings of birds (fairs, exhibitions, contests, auctions) and reminds all owners of farmed birds to comply with the Regulation respecting the sanitary conditions of places where captive birds are kept in order to prevent contact between poultry and wild birds.

Watch for these clinical signs in your birds:

- Lack of energy and appetite
- Decreased egg production and laying of many softshelled or unshelled eggs
- Swelling of the head, eyelids, crest, wattles and hocks
- Coughing, sneezing and nervous signs
- Diarrhea
- Lack of coordination
- Sudden death

If unusual deaths or signs of the disease occur, consult a veterinarian. If you are unable to reach a veterinarian, call **450 768-6763** to reach the Canadian Food Inspection Agency's sick bird reporting line or **1 844 ANIMALS** to contact MAPAQ's Reporting Centre.

MAPAQ reminds that the risk to the general population is low, as cases of avian influenza in humans are rare and usually occur through close contact with infected birds.

All poultry owners have a responsibility to protect their birds and the health of the Quebec flock. Visit the Québec.ca/ AvianFlu web page for more information.

MUNICPAL TAXES

This is a reminder that the second instalment of the municipal tax bill is due on July 1, 2023. The privilege of paying in three instalments can only be granted if all instalments are paid when due. Any payments received late will bear interest and penalties on the entire account.

2023 MUNICIPAL PROGRAM FOR THE EMPTYING OF SEPTIC TANKS

The Municipality will carry out the emptying of septic tanks on its territory this fall (between September 1st and November 1st). Note that this service is offered without additional costs under certain conditions. In conformity with the current provincial By-Law on the matter (Q-2, r.22), a septic tank used year-round must be emptied every 2 years and every 4 years for a septic tank used on a seasonal basis.

A regular septic waste collection, combined with a quality construction of your septic system and proper maintenance, will allow it to be used to its full potential, maximize its useful life and protect your investment.

Just search "Guide des bonnes pratiques systèmes septiques" in Google to obtain the Ministry of Environment's best practices guide (All information available in French only).

More information to follow by the end of the summer in the Indispensable, through the mail, on social networks and the Municipality's website.

As of <u>April 30</u>, all shelters considered as temporary, such as garages

(mobile wood panels or canvas) and snow fences, must be dismantled.



According to the established by-law, these structures are authorized from October 1 to April 30.

Please respect your neighborhood and comply

with this regulation under penalty of law.

(\$200 minimum per day for a continuing offense).

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL OF BITING INSECTS

The Municipality will resume biological control of biting insects in the summer of 2023 with the firm Conseillers forestiers Roy (CFR).

Control of biting insects

Definition: Program whose objective is to control the nuisance caused by **black flies** and **mosquitoes** by using no chemical pesticides.

CFR controls biting insects using a **selective biological larvicide**, BTI. *Treatments are carried out on larval* breeding sites in the water environment by hand and ground. The area targeted for treatment generally covers several square kilometers depending on the characteristics of the site to be protected and the environmental conditions.

What species are treated?

Only small black flies and mosquitoes are treated for biological control of biting insects. Ticks, fireflies,

houseflies and strikers are not affected by the treatment.

The biting insect control program is seeking the cooperation of citizens to allow access to areas of high production of mosquitoes and black flies for application crews.



MAY 28 - COMMUNITY YARD SALE AND DISTRIBUTION OF TREE SAPLINGS

On May 28 from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm, the Sports and Recreation Department will be holding a community yard sale. You have the opportunity to rent a table or tables during the sale. A total of 22 tables will be available on the covered municipal rink. You can register on the AMILIA platform of the Municipality's website. You will have the option of paying online or coming to City Hall to pay. However, if your table is not paid for on the day of the sale, your registration will be cancelled. The price is set at \$10 per table and tables are reserved for residents 18 years of age and older. Reserve early! The event will take place rain or shine. Please note that the Public Works Department will have tools and small equipment for sale or donation; first come, first served!

Also, in May, as part of Tree and Forest Month, the *Ministère des Forêts, de la Faune et des Parcs* is organizing activities in collaboration with the Association forestière des deux rives (AF2R). For the occasion, we are planning to distribute free tree sapplings in order to raise the population's awareness of the importance of and respect for the tree and the forest. Don't forget to come and choose a free tree sappling when you visit the exhibitors on Sunday, May 28.



TREATMENT TO ERADICATE AMBROSIA

The Municipality will participate in a treatment program to eradicate ragweed.

The common goal is to **permanently eliminate** this highly allergenic plant.

We therefore count on the participation of the entire community in order to reach our goal to permanently eliminate ragweed.

Here's how you can actively participate:

- 1. Uproot any ragweed plants on your property.
- 2. Locate the infested zones in your neighbourhood.
- 3. Make your neighbours aware of the hazards posed by this plant.

This annual collective **program** aims to **significantly reduce** pollen levels and this, in the best interest of the local population.



PUBLIC WORKS

HOW TO DISPOSE OF YOUR HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD WASTE (HHW)?

Since the opening of the Eco-Centre (2329 Boulevard Valcartier), the Municipality no longer offers the collection of household hazardous waste (HHW) twice yearly. You must bring your dangerous materials to the depot location.

Here is a list of materials that can be recuperated:

PAINTS

Sold by retail businesses (100 ml containers and larger); sold by wholesale businesses (170 L containers and larger intended for architectural use); primers and paints (latex, alkyd, enamel and other); metal or anti-rust paint, staine; aluminum paint; dyes; varnishes; lacquers; products or preparations for the treatment of wood (preservatives) or masonry (acrylic sealers for driveways); signalisation paints (those available in retail businesses); Aerosol paints.

ORGANIC HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD WASTE

Acetone, adhesives, aerosols, solid fire starter, rubbing alcohol, starter fluid, glue, wax, antifreeze, caulking, dye, plastic cement, solid fuel, fondue fuel, lock de-icer, degreasing agents, oil stain remover, paint thinner, petroleum distillate, ink, epoxy, gasoline, ethylene glycol, roofing tar, motor grease, heating and lamp oil, lubricant, methanol, petroleum, polish, Polyfilla, leather, suede or vinyl protector, liquid resin, silicone sealant, wallpaper remover, shoe dye, turpentine, toluene.

INORGANIC HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD WASTE

Acids, bases, oxidizing agents, batteries, pesticides and insecticides

Fluorescent compact light bulbs (CFL)

If you are not sure if a product that you would like to dispose of is on the list, bring it with you and the trained employees will help you.

Each container must be intended for residential use only. All products must be in their original containers. For safety reasons, do not mix products. You may also bring in your used oil, used oil filters and oil containers (non commercial use only). This service is also offered free of charge throughout the year by the Municipality during bulk waste pickup upon reservation of the service.

BULK GARBAGE COLLECTION (BULK WASTE)

The Municipality collects bulk waste on a weekly basis. Please do not deposit non-household waste in front of large refuse containers or community mailboxes. You must call 418 844-1218 to request this service with itemized list of materials to be collected or register online on the Municipality's Website, under the «On-line request» section.

Note that this service is offered a maximum of 4 times per year, per residence.

It is important that the materials to be collected be set out in an organized manner (ex: carpets must be rolled and tied, metal must be sorted, wire must be rolled and tied, etc.)

You may dispose of used tires (non-commercial use only) and rims. You can also dispose of used vegetable oil. Oil must be in its original container or in an identified clear plastic bottle.

Please note that vehicle carcasses or frames, tree and brush debris, household garbage and leaves as well as recyclable materials will not be collected during the weekly collections.

You may also dispose of these materials as well as renovation materials at the Saint-Gabriel-de-Valcartier Eco-Centre (2329 Boulevard Valcartier). You may not dispose of these in your household garbage bin as the waste management company will not pick up your garbage.

Thank you for your collaboration.

The Municipality asks for your collaboration in regards to garbage bins. Once your



garbage and recycling has been picked up, please remove them from the side of the road and return them to your house as soon as possible in order to avoid risks of theft. Thank you!

FIRE SAFETY DEPARTMENT

Prevention Visits



The Municipality of Saint-Gabriel-de-Valcartier Fire Department wishes to inform the population that the Residential Fire Prevention Program will be back to its original format as of May 2023. Uniformed and identified firefighters from the Fire Department will be visiting homes in our Municipality.

These firefighters are mandated by the Fire Safety Department to inspect smoke alarms and make recommendations should you have any questions about the safety of your home. All of this is in accordance with municipal **By-law**No 213 concerning Fire Prevention. The purpose of these visits is to prevent fire hazards in order to ensure your safety.

As part of their visits, firefighters will verify the installation and operation of smoke alarms. We remind you that a smoke alarm must be installed on each floor, including the basement. The best places to install them are in the hallways, near the bedrooms, making sure that there are no obstacles blocking the flow of smoke.

Whether battery-operated or electric, smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years according to the instructions on the alarm unit. Building owners must provide their tenants with a smoke alarm, but it is the tenant's responsibility to change the battery. It should be noted that batteries must be replaced every 6 months. We suggest that this be done at each time change.

Spring vegetation burning

Did you know that burning grass and vegetation in the spring can be very dangerous?

Many small dry materials are present on cleared land. We suggest that you consult the index-o-meter on the *Société de protection des forêts contre le feu* website at <u>sopfeu.qc.ca</u> or in front of the Fire Hall before burning. Fires should not be set during periods of drought when the index is high or extreme. It is easier to lose control of a fire on a hot, windy or dry day. The propagation can be very fast and sneaky when the wind is blowing. It is therefore strongly recommended not to use this type of method to clean up your property. Wood and grass clippings can be disposed of by composting and chipping rather than burning them at home. This choice is environmentally friendly.

CIVIL SECURITY

In an emergency situation, you and your family will need to be prepared for the first 72 hours and cope without power or running water.

As it is with the entire population, it is your responsibility to have a <u>72-hour emergency kit in your home</u>. This kit will ensure your family's self-sufficiency during an evacuation or sheltering situation. Find out what to do in the event of a disaster. The Department of Public Safety offers a list of essential items to have in case of an emergency. This kit will help ensure your family's self-sufficiency during an evacuation or lockdown situation.

SHARP-SHINNE HAWK

The SHARP-SHINNED HAWK is a member of the Accipitridae family of raptors. It measures between 25 cm and 35 cm and weighs between 85 and 125 grams. This raptor has an important binocular vision, allowing an effective identification of prey. It has a beak whose upper jaw is curved like a hook capable of tearing flesh and its legs equipped with 4 fingers curved and sharp making it capable of capturing prey.

More than 80% of Sharp-shinned hawk population are found in North America and we are fortunate in Saint-Gabriel to be able to observe this magnificent hunter of prey in large numbers. Mixed coniferous and deciduous forests constitute all of its habitat, whether during nesting season of its hunting territory.

Pair formation often depends on the ability of the male to hunt and bring back enough prey to impress the female. The couple will build its nest in a conifer to provide good protection against aerial predators such as the Great Horned Owl. The female will lay between 3 and 6 eggs and cover alone for 30 days while her partner is responsible for providing her with food. Once hatched, the chicks will take flight within 24-27 days.

Not to be confused with the Cooper's Hawk, the Sharp-shinned hawk is smaller in size than the Cooper's Hawk and in flight, the Sharp-shinned hawk has short, rounded wings and its black and gray barred tail has a square tip. Take a photo, when possible, to clearly and better identify it.

The Sharp-shinned haw's main predators are undoubtedly the red-tailed hawk and the great horned owl.

The Sharp-shinned hawk is a fascinating bird to observe when hunting as it captures its prey trying to take advantage of the surprise effect and thus the victims are

caught after a short chase. It is not uncommon to see the Sharp-shinned hawk settle on a perch, near feeders where it watches for small birds that come to eat; it is a very specialized raptor in capturing birds that contribute 90% of its diet.

A PEEK AT THE PAST

First of July Picnics

Stories from Helen Montgomery, Sadie Hicks and Marjorie McCoubrey as told to Debbie Chakour, Excerpt from the book "Back in the Day".

If you grew up in Valcartier "back in the day", July 1st was eagerly anticipated as it meant an afternoon of fun at not one, but two picnics! Both the Presbyterian Church and the United Church held picnics at the same time, one being up on the hill by the Presbyterian Church and the other at the United church Hall.

In the weeks before the picnic, members of the Ladies Aid (both United and Presbyterian) would go to stores and businesses in Loretteville and ask for donations of prizes for the fish-pond and races. Merchants were very generous and the women rarely, if ever, had to buy anything. The fishpond (one for each denomination) was made by suspending a blanket so that the child, who had been given a pole with a hook on the string, could "go fishing" by casting over the blanket. Someone would then attach the jumping rope, or ball, or jewellery, or other such small prize to the hook.

Both picnics also had races which were organised by the men. There would be regular running races for all age groups as well as novelty races such as the three-legged race. At the Presbyterian picnic, the races also included a bit of track and field with a high jump and a hop-step-jump. The children would go running from one picnic to the other, calculating the most advantageous times to switch. With all the comings and goings, it was to count how many people would be gathered, but it had the feel of the whole community coming together, with many, many children!






